Wolcum Yole! Welcome Christmas! Thank you for attending our annual Christmas concert. We are excited to share with you *A Ceremony of Carols*. It was written in 1942 when the English composer Benjamin Britten was 29 years old. It is one of Britten's most popular and widely performed works, particularly during the Christmas season. *A Ceremony of Carols* was composed in part during five weeks that Britten spent travelling by ship from New York to England during World War II. His ship stopped in Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he purchased a book of medieval poetry. Poems from this book, along with Gregorian Chant and other poetry spanning 14th to 16th century England, were the inspiration for *A Ceremony of Carols*, which includes both a Christmas narrative as well as references to the re-birth of spring.

For us, a Christmas concert isn't complete without traditional carols and songs, so we found new and interesting songs to share and brought back some of our favorites, adding piano, oboe, cello, strings and/or harp accompaniments. It is a delight to share the stage with these accomplished musicians from our local and nearby communities. All of us hope you have an enjoyable and memorable evening as we share our music to celebrate Christmas.

Cassie Turner, born and raised in the Pacific Northwest, has nearly 10 years experience teaching and performing. With her Bachelors in Harp Performance, Cassie's passion is to instill a love of music in her students both for piano and harp, and shares the joy of music in solo performance as well as performing with the Bremerton Symphony, Washington Wind Symphony, and others.

Aaron Inglin of Olympia has performed to critical acclaim throughout the northwest, Canada and abroad. He began playing violin at age 4. He has studied with Helen De Pastel-Pagels, Tyler Reilly, and Carrie Rehkopf-Michel. He formed the Abraxas Quartet, one of 8 string ensembles chosen nationally to compete in the Fischoff national chamber music competition. He was chosen as a soloist for the west coast premiere of George Crumb's "Star-Child" at Benaroya Hall. In 2006, he won the concertmaster position of the Olympia Symphony Orchestra, the youngest to hold this position in its almost 60 year history.

Jon Hanson was born and raised in Alaska. He started learning violin as a child and has played ever since, earning his degree in music from Western Washington University. Jon spent time in Hungary studying baroque violin where he also had his first venture in crafting violin bows. He has toured and performed across Europe. Jon is currently part owner of R.L. Ray Violin Shop where he manages the shop and makes and repairs violin family bows. He is an active performer, including with the Olympia Symphony.

Kate Inglin, a native of Bainbridge Island, began studying the violin at the age of six. At 13, she won the young artist competition and performed with the Bainbridge Orchestra. She played in the Seattle Youth Symphony as a youth, and went on to study violin performance at Central Washington University where she was concertmaster for 3 years of both the Symphony and Chamber Orchestra. Kate and her husband Aaron, formed a competitive string quartet, the Gestalt String Quartet, which competed and toured nationally. She has toured and performed up and down both coasts, Chicago and Italy. She has performed with the Mammoth Lakes Summer Symphony, the Malibu Coast Chamber Ensemble, and for the past 10 years is Assistant Principal Viola of the Olympia Symphony Orchestra.

Mya Alspaugh is a senior at Olympia High School. She is the principal cellist for their Chamber and Symphony Orchestras. She has been playing cello for eight years, studying with Holly Reeves, principal cellist of the Olympia Symphony Orchestra. Mya plans to continue her musical studies in college while pursuing a degree in Music Therapy."

Karen Berets earned a Bachelor of Music from Seattle Pacific University and a Master of Music from University of Washington. She performed with Seattle Opera, Seattle Symphony and Joffrey Ballet. She was soloist with the Wenatchee Symphony and Southwest Washington Symphony. Her teachers include Ray Still of the Chicago Symphony, Bernard Shapiro of the Seattle Symphony, Laila Storch of the Soni Ventorum Wind Quintet and Joel Timm of the University of Southern California. She has performed with the Olympia Symphony, Masterworks Choral Ensemble, Northwest Wind Symphony, and Capital Philharmonic. Karen has served as Teaching Artist with Student Orchestras of Greater Olympia (SOGO) and traveled to Italy, performing with the SOGO faculty wind quintet. She taught Orchestra, Band and General Music for 28 years at Evergreen Christian School in Olympia and is currently teaching Kindergarten -3rd Grade General Music in the Olympia School District. She also maintains a successful private studio.

Suzanne Montgomery enjoys teaching elementary music at Mountain View Elementary School. She is widely respected for her skills as an accompanist and director, and for bringing local choirs together for Shelton's Songs of Freedom to honor veterans. Suzanne accompanies Harstine Island Community Choir, professional musicians for concerts, and young musicians for solo/ensemble contests as well as for local events. She has enjoyed accompanying and/or singing under the baton of well known directors Drs. Nance, Peterson, Jessop and Rutter. She earned her degree in music education from Pacific Lutheran University, and her Master of Education and Creative Arts from Lesley University in Cambridge, MA.

Elizabeth Berndt supports local musicians and choirs as a conductor, singer or accompanist, helping organize events like Shelton's Tree Lighting Ceremony or taking choirs statewide to perform at events like the Puyallap State Fair. She studied conducting with Dr. Ron Jeffers of Oregon State University, and voice with Dr. Geoffrey Boers of University of Washington and holds Bachelor's Degrees in Music and Music Education, with emphasis in Choral Conducting, and a Masters Degree in Education. She worked as a Dodds high school teacher in Germany, accompanied the German American Choir, and was rehearsal director and singer for Karlshoehe Kantorei. In August she performed with the Tacoma Symphony Choir in Croatia and Bosnia Herzegovina. She and Suzanne Montgomery recently presented a vocal recital in Shelton, and continue to work together for "Women of Note," bringing choral music to as many people as possible in our region.
